Secondary Futures

For secondary teachers, the past few years of the pandemic saw a switch to semesters to accommodate the "quarter" system which was supposed to limit physical and social interactions of students to contain the spread of COVID-19. That "experiment" has persisted in the employment of semesters across all seven secondary schools in Delta up to the present. However, the DTA can report that the District's Secondary Futures Committee has met and discussed a process whereby schools can examine survey findings; they will then decide what their timetables will look like for next year. Several options are being offered, and both admin and teachers are part of the committee bringing back information to staff. Schools must decide prior to March 7, 2023, as that is the date by which the Delta Board of Trustees must be informed.

Uncertified Teachers

The DTA has been approached by members who are concerned to hear that other school districts are so short of teachers they are considering hiring uncertified teachers. Uncertified? What does that mean: did they not complete a teacher training program or did they not pass?

There have been questions:

- * How many uncertified teachers does Delta currently have?
- * Is Delta thinking of hiring uncertified teachers like Langley and Chilliwack?
- * Do they pay into all the same fund we do? DTA? BCTF?
- * If Delta hires uncertified teachers, do we call them "teachers"?

Who would support them since they have no training or background?

Unfortunately, while there are many questions there are fewer answers. And this potential may never come to pass in Delta. Certainly, the District has not shared any plans to hire uncertified teachers as TTOCs and has expressed that they do not plan to. But the crystal ball is still hazy and as the District is frequently attending hiring fairs to find new people, it is hard to know what the future holds.

Historical Context

When my mother started teaching in Delta back in the early seventies, she was uncertified with only a couple years of university. Then she went on to get her degree and her PDP from SFU. So, this has happened before. The issue of uncertified teachers will surely come to the floor of the BCTF AGM for discussion. And the DTA released table officers will be sure to keep you posted.
